## CORRIGENDUM TO THE NOTE

from: French delegation

to : Technical and Forensic Police Working Party

#### Subject: Interception of telecommunications

Analysis of replies to the questionnaire (4584/95 ENFOPOL 19, point 2) on the integration of the Council Resolution of 17 January 1995 on the interception of telecommunications into national law

#### 1. <u>Page 5, point 2.3</u>

The last sentence of this point should read as follows:

"Nothing has been decided as yet in Finland and Denmark."

# 2. <u>Page 6</u>

The text of the proposals and recommendations should be replaced by the following:

### "PROPOSED WORKING METHOD FOR THE FUTURE

As the process of integrating the Resolution into national law has not yet been completed, the French delegation proposes to keep this impact study up to date by adding the following:

- 1. Progress with the integration of the Resolution in those States where legislative reform is under way.
- 2. New facts which have emerged since then in other Member States in particular as regards relations with manufacturers and service providers.

In any event, delegations are invited to send any comments for correcting this document, in case their replies have been misinterpreted.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

Moreover, the Working Party is invited to adopt the following recommendations:

- It will continue to keep itself informed on progress with the integration of Resolution ENFOPOL 90 into national laws; this will also apply to supplementary resolutions to be adopted in the future (e.g. following the CANBERRA seminar);
- 2. It undertakes to consider ways of apprising constructors quickly;
- Without prejudice to future technological progress and the legal consequences thereof, it will examine all supplementary questions linked to the problem of interception in the framework of Resolution ENFOPOL 90;
- 4. It seems essential that informal contacts be maintained with third countries given the increasing internationalization of communications."
