




Enhanced cross-border cooperation

Persisting challenges

- Incomplete situational awareness limit coordinated response
- Fragmentation in deployments and information sharing by liaison officers in third countries
- Vulnerabilities in border checks
- Limited capacities for return
- Obstacles to the cross-border exchange of information, particularly linked to ineffective and non-automated Single Points of Contact

Overall State of Implementation



Main takeaways for border management



Strategic processes: EIBM, Capability Roadmap and Contingency planning.



Border surveillance: integrated surveillance systems, coordination and cooperation, risk analysis and situational awareness.



Strong divergencies in the quality of **border checks** at the EU external borders, highlighting particularly low levels in some Member States.




EUROSUR: increased quality and volume of the information exchange. However, operational results and risk analyses are not fully integrated; need for further processing and analysis of information on cross-border crime.



Frontex: 22 operational activities ongoing. Need to take the current dynamic environment into account to provide for specialised profiles to address existing gaps. Follow-up to the EBCG evaluation.

Follow-up Report

- Recommendation (EU) 2024/268 on cooperation between the Member States with regard to serious threats to internal security and public policy in the
- Report on the consultation by the Schengen Coordinator of the Member States concerned by the reintroduction of internal border controls between May and November 2023
- Ongoing dialogue on internal border controls, building on best practices from the consultation
- Based on the information contained in the notifications and additional information received in the framework of the dialogue

Follow-up Report

- The Report covers the period October 2023 March 2024
- Update of the situation at border sections that were subject to the consultation process: AUT, DE, DK, FR, SE, NO
- Overview of the situation at border sections subject to a reintroduction of internal border controls since 2023: AUT, IT, DE, PL, CZ, SK, SI
- Inventory of bilateral and regional cooperation initiatives developed by Member States

Main observations



 Checks are often non-systematic, based on risk assessment and accompanied by mitigating measures to ensure the fluidity of cross-border traffic



 Bilateral law enforcement cooperation has increased, with Member States developing joint activities such as joint police patrols in common border areas



 Day-to-day contacts and information exchange at joint service centres and Police and Customs Cooperation Centres (PCCCs) ensure situational awareness and help to address cross-border crime, including human smuggling in border areas



 Member States have bilateral readmisson agreements in place, but diverging practices following case law of the CJEU

Main observations


- Increase in regional forms of cooperation, both at operational and political level
- Often involving neighbouring third countries under a 'whole-of-route-approach'
- Often within the framework of existing structures for cooperation: Visegrad+, Salzburg Forum. Brdo-process, Joint Coordination Platform
- New initiatives: joint trilateral cooperation (HR/IT/SI), Border Security Taskforce (AUT/HU/RS), OTF Vistula (CZ/DE/HU/LT/UA), OTF Zebra (DE/HR/IT/SI/BA)




Way Forward

- The revised Schengen Borders Code once adopted will provide a reinforced framework for the use of cross-border police cooperation in border regions as an alternative to internal border controls
- Member States are encouraged consolidate and further develop bilateral and multilateral cross-border cooperation, making full use of available alternative measures, in line with Recommendation (EU) 2024/268
- The new transfer procedure under the revised Schengen Borders Code will facilitate readmissions at the internal borders

Way Forward

- The Schengen Coordinator will continue the active dialogue with Member States, including on readmission at the internal border and – once adopted – the entry into force of the revised Schengen Borders Code
- The Commission will continue to assist Member States in their efforts to step up regional cooperation
- The Commission calls on all Member States to continue to work towards phasing out remaining internal borders controls and a sustainable joint management of common challenges
- The Schengen Coordinator will report regularly in the Schengen Council on the state of play and progress made.



Delivering on Schengen governance



Reinforce the role of the Schengen Council by providing a structured follow-up framework for common priorities and increased political dialogue, common ownership and collective responsibility of all Member States



Stepping up the implementation of the Schengen rules through unity of action, thereby reinforcing the governance of the Schengen area



Based on the **results of the Schengen evaluations** and the persistent challenges raised by Member States during the Schengen Council



Concrete issues where individual actions of Member States and collective action of the Schengen Council would bring added value, in line with existing policy initiatives on Schengen matters
